Remarks of Mr. Hidenobu Sobashima, Ambassador of Japan to the Republic of Zambia at the Premiere Evening of Japan Film Festival 2017 at Ster-Kinekor, Manda Hill Mall Cinema on Tuesday 3 October 2017

Mr. Adrian Chipindi, Director, National Arts Council, Ministry of Tourism and Arts of the Republic of Zambia, Distinguished Guests, Representatives from the Media, Ladies and Gentlemen, Boys and Girls,

Welcome to the Premiere Evening of Japan Film Festival 2017.

Our Embassy has been hosting Japan Film Festival from 2005 and this is the 11th Festival to be held from tonight to the Thursday night.

We will be showing "A Living Promise" tonight, "The Vancouver Asashi" tomorrow, and "Sing My Life" on Thursday.

A Living Promise is a story about a businessman of the IT industry who tried hard to keep a promise with his friend. However, he will face difficulties and lose all his assets, but through that he will review himself, with the background of a traditional rural area of Japan.

I hope that you will enjoy the Japanese film and will return home safely, hopefully with better appreciation of Japan and at least better understanding of Japan.
