Japanese govt pledges to support Vision 2030

THE Japanese government has pledged support to the country to achieve Vision 2030 of becoming a prosperous middle income and leaving no one behind.

Japanese Ambassador to Zambia Hidenobu Sobashima said his government would cooperate with Zambia in developmental projects meant to uplift the livelihoods like agriculture and access to clean and safe water.

Mr Sobashima said his country attached importance to the agricultural corporation with Zambia hence sending a high-level special advisor to ensure that the sector advances.

He said this yesterday when he paid a courtesy call on Luapula Province acting Permanent Secretary Royd Chakaba.

Mr Sobashima said he was in the province to conduct a press four aimed at highlighting the activities been undertaken by his government as well as appreciate the progress on the water and agriculture projects.

"Zambia and Japan have enjoyed bilateral relations since the 1970's which has seen my government undertake projects aimed at improving water and sanitation for people living in rural setups, "Mr Sobashima said."

He said Luapula Province hosted a successful investment expo and having been endowed with the necessary resources had the potential to reduce the high poverty levels being recorded.

And Mr Chakaba said the Government was happy with the bilateral cooperation with Japan, which was impacting positively on the vulnerable in society.

Mr Chakaba said the country's Seventh National Development Plan was anchored in the Vision 2030 of not leaving anyone behind by ensuring equal access to social amenities.

He said the Japanese government had undertaken agriculture and water projects in the province that were helping to eradicate poverty and improve people's livelihoods.
