Remarks of Mr. Ryuta Mizuuchi, Ambassador-Designate of Japan to the Republic of Zambia on the Occasion of the 10th Ambassador's Karate Tournament at the Olympic Youth Development Centre in Lusaka November 10^{th,} 2019

My special thanks go to the Ministry of Youth, Sport and Child Development as well as the sponsors who have made significant contributions to enable this tournament to take place.

I think this year's tournament is something very special – not just because of celebrating its 10th anniversary after having become a major sport event in

Zambia. As you are aware, Karate will join the Olympic event for the first time in history as Japan hosts the 2020 Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games, Tokyo next year. Congratulations!

Not coincidentally, Africa and Japan have never been so close to each other than in this year. At the time I was preparing for my Ambassadorship in August, I witnessed how great a success the 7th Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD VII) held in Yokohama was, and the positive impact it has brought about.
