Envoy sees brighter Zambian economy

JAPANESE Ambassador to Zambia Kiyoshi Kiyoshi has said Zambia has huge potential to overcome the current economic challenges.

Mr Kiyoshi has also called for the prioritising of education as a vital component in speeding up the development process.

"Education is key in fostering national development. Without it, a country has no direction. This means we should make education a priority in order to develop," Mr Kiyoshi said.

He said Japan had allocated US\$2 million to boost the education sector in Zambia.

Mr Kiyoshi said one of Japan's policies for Zambia was to promote the business sector by inviting and encouraging Japanese companies to invest in the country.

He said Japanese firms would help promote Zambian companies by providing capital and sharing ideas.

The Japanese-Zambian trade cooperation, he noted, would create jobs for youths in the country.

He urged Zambian companies to partner with foreign ones to ramp up performance of the business sector.

Meanwhile, Japan International Cooperation Agency representative Kazuki Kaiya has said the organisation has started upgrading five clinics to hospital level to help improve healthcare services in Zambia.

Mr Kaiya said Zambia was facing challenges in the provision of quality health services due to limited hospitals.

"The demand for health services is high and upgrading clinics is a priority to us as an organisation, as this will contribute to Zambia's development," Mr Kaiya said.

Mr Kaiya said the organisation would soon start upgrading three other clinics, namely, Chipata, Chawama and Kanyama in Lusaka.

Japan pledges \$2.5m for education

JAPANESE ambassador to Zambia Kiyoshi Koinuma says his country will by the end of the year sign a grant aid of US\$2.5 million to support education in Zambia.

Mr Koinuma said the funds will be utilised for scaling up of the numbers of school teachers in Zambia.

He said education is important sector for the future of Zambia and its people.

The ambassador was briefing journalists at the Japanese International Co-operation Agency (JICA) media breakfast in Lusaka yesterday.

Mr Koinuma also said Japan is ready to help Zambia overcome the current energy deficit by investing in research to come up with the best sources of energy.

He also said Zambia needs to have energy security because it is essential for industrial development.

"Energy is one of the priority economic sectors that Japan wants to support because Zambia is facing challenges in the sector," he said.

The ambassador said four other sectors Japan has prioritised in Zambia are agriculture, education, manufacturing, and health-care.

"We are promoting irrigation in Zambia for the country to get the most out of agriculture," he said.

Japanese ambassador says lack of finances affects local manufactures

JAPANESE Ambassador Kiyoshi Koinuma says lack of financing is severely affecting Zambian manufacturing companies from operating competitively.

And Ambassador Koinuma says the current energy challenge the country is facing must be sorted out if the country is to achieve optimal development.

Speaking during a Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) breakfast meeting in Lusaka yesterday, Ambassador Koinuma said there was need for Zambian companies to partner with Japanese businesses if they are to thrive in the private sector because they lacked strong financial muscle.

"Japan as a partner to Zambia is trying by all means to offer assistance to the Zambian government as a way of promoting sustainable growth of a diversified economy. From my understanding, we are very much interested in helping Zambia improve in the energy sector, agriculture, health, education and manufacturing," Ambassador Koinuma said.

"However, Zambia has a challenge in the energy sector and this has to be sorted out if the nation is to achieve optimal development."

Ambassador Koinuma

financing among Zambian companies was one key issue which was affecting local companies and he recommended that local businesses should work with international firms if they were to be competitive on the global market.

"The major challenge affecting Zambian companies is financing; many companies don't have enough funds to operate normally and the best way is to work with Japanese companies and other international firms if they are to thrive in the private sector, especially in manufacturing," said Ambassador Koinuma.

And JICA chief

Hisanao Noda said his cooperation had continued to help Zambia in the areas of financial and technical support.

"As JICA, we are on top of things in ensuring that we help Zambia in any way possible in the area of financial support and technical assistance," Noda said.

"We are doing everything to help Zambia in the transport sector, energy, education and water and sanitation. We anticipate the completion of two health centres being upgraded from clinic status to district hospitals or first level hospitals; these are Chilenje

and Matero health centres."

He further said other initiatives include capacity building in bridge maintenance and the on-going National Kaizen Project in the country.

"JICA has also recorded the successful completion of rehabilitation works for Chirundu Bridge, which is a very important bridge in the light of its facilitation of passage of both people and commercial goods and equipment between Zambia and Zimbabwe. The Chirundu One-Stop Border Post is one of the major contributors to Zambia's tax revenue," said Noda.




